## Mons-Linz: The 2014 Campus Exhibition

(Linz, August 25, 2014) The Campus exhibition has become a popular annual fixture at the Ars Electronica Festival. It showcases outstanding work by students in Linz Art University's Interface Cultures program and their counterparts at a non-Austrian academy. This year's guest institution is ARTS<sup>2</sup> – École supérieure des Arts in Mons, Belgium. Both exhibitions will run throughout the festival at Linz Art University's main facility (ARTS<sup>2</sup>) as well as Raumschiff and Strafsachenstelle (Interface Cultures) on Linz's Main Square (Hauptplatz).

ARTS<sup>2</sup> is an art academy in Belgium that provides training in the visual arts, music and theater. Its multidisciplinary structure makes it the ideal place for collaborative projects by students in different majors. High on the educational agenda is teaching students to use a wide variety of tools, computer programming in particular. The Department of Electroacoustic Music is the only one of its kind in Europe. This extensive exhibition at Ars Electronica is designed to acquaint international audiences with the extraordinary work being done at ARTS<sup>2</sup>. ## Interface Cultures: The 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

It's been 10 years since Christa Sommerer (AT) and Laurent Mignonneau (FR) established the Interface Cultures program at Linz Art University. Ever since, interactive art and innovative interfaces at the nexus of art, design and research have occupied the focal point of this course of study in both theory and practice. Over the past decade, students have completed approximately 150 projects and written 40 master's theses. Many of these works have been on display in "Interface Cultures," an exhibition that has come to be an Ars Electronica Festival fixture. This year's exhibition venues are on Hauptplatz. The curators are celebrating the program's 10th anniversary by staging an especially extensive show featuring 17 works by 40 students from 13 countries. The exhibition has been curated by Christa Sommerer, Laurent Mignonneau, Martin Kaltenbrunner, Michaela Ortner and Reinhard Gupfinger. The works are: Senseparation by students at Ludwig Maximilian University Munich and Linz Art University in cooperation with the Leibnitz Supercomputing Centre of the Bavarian Academy of Sciences and Humanities, Ursuppe by Davide Bevilacqua and Alberto Boem, A Tanqible Score by Enrique Tomas, Mattresspipe by Ivan Petkov, Data Auditorio by Daichi Misawa, Tapebook by Cesar Escudero Andaluz, Memory Wheel by Davide Bevilacqua, Kurzschluss by Veronika Kren, Trā\(\textit{Daka}\) by Alessio Chierico, Hacking Meditation-when stillness interacts, Greetings from Eastern Europe by Ioan-Ovidiu Cernei and Tiina Sööt, Root Node by Nathan Guo, 60 flavours by Ulrich Lantzberg, Money Never Sleeps by Martin Nadal, That Way by İdil Kızoğl, My Haptic Diary by Jure Finguš and Translation III / Strafsachen by Cristian Villavicencio.
